Loppers within the Forest School approach and by Rewilding are considered tools which are used in order to meaningfully achieve or produce something. They are used to cut wood which has a diameter less than a two pence piece- typically during coppicing. The use of tools is specifically considered within the FSA's principles and are not simply used for the sake of using them, rather they are used to develop awareness, responsibility and to allow success.
