The spoon knife is an additional tool that appears to possess a minor place in the Forest School and bushcraft repertoire; however, the prevalence of spoon making means it is often used. The nature of using the spoon knife means that it is done within the helper hand and close to the body. The result of using a spoon knife, and the previous low instances of injury means that n balance the use of the spoon knife should be supported. It should be considered that strength is needed for the spoon knife to be effective, which means that participants may need to be older to use it.

This RA should be read in conjunction with other carving/cutting tools which will be used as part of the spoon carving process.
